When a mysterious and charming Frenchman appears at his graveside, a path to reconciliation opens, leading Anna to Paris... Beautifully shot, largely in black and white, and with a "stunning" (*The Guardian*) performance from newcomer Paula Beer as Anna.

Following the shocking news of her brother's death, trainee vet Clover Catto returns to the Somerset farm where she grew up. She must now address a fractured relationship with her father, who becomes abrasive and uncooperative when she tries to find out the cause of the tragedy. In a flood-damaged setting, the mystery deepens in a film of intense emotion, conveyed by two outstanding central performances. Dickson Leach's first feature tackles a challenging subject with such assurance that great things can be expected from her in future.



The Happiest Day in the Life of Olli Mäki (12A)

 In 1962, Finnish boxer Olli Mäki was surprisingly lined up to challenge for the world featherweight boxing title, fighting on home turf against US favourite Davey Moore. Everyone wants him to win and put Finland on the map, but Olli is more preoccupied with the girl he has just fallen in love with. With beautifully recreated settings shot in luminous black and white 16mm, this is "a film of immense humanity and charm: the very best kind of date movie" (*The Guardian*).

After stealing a young woman's fiancé, Death challenges her to save one of three lives with the power of love – and so we are transported to Arabia, Venice and Ancient China, where she takes the part of other women trying to rescue their men from mortal danger. With a newly composed orchestral score, this meticulously restored silent movie is an early classic by the great director Fritz Lang (*Metropolis, M*).

cousin. Previously filmed with Richard Burton and Olivia de Havilland in 1952, this version from director and screenwriter Michell (*Notting Hill, Enduring Love, Le Weekend*) has a more modern sensibility. Beautiful Devon and Florence locations enhance this gripping new production.
